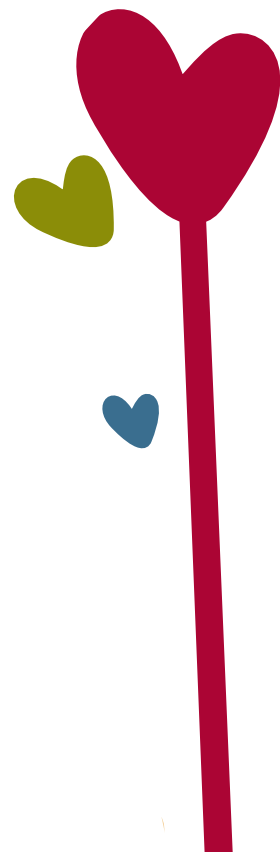

We saw Andrew Muirhead move on from the Foundation to take on the role of leading Inspiring Scotland, which spun out from the Foundation at the start of 2009 and is now a completely separate organisation. Whilst we are obviously delighted that Andrew has a new role, he has led the Foundation for the last 12 years and has taken the organisation through huge development so will be sorely missed.

During 2008 we carried out a review of our grant-making criteria and also worked hard at putting in place more rigorous evaluation of the work we fund through our Standard Grant Scheme. Evaluation has been at the heart of our Partnership Drugs Initiative for some time,

and we are keen to help organisations funded through our Standard Grant Scheme benefit from improved evaluation. This will also help the Foundation evaluate the impact of its own work more fully, letting us learn how we can become even more effective.

Looking ahead to 2009 and beyond, there will undoubtedly be challenging times to come for the voluntary sector. Our own income from Lloyds TSB Group is down on the level we enjoyed in 2008. What We Fund

“Lloyds TSB Foundation for Scotland funds charities registered in Scotland whose work is focused on improving quality of life and creating equality of opportunity for people in Scotland.”

It is one of four independent charitable trusts distributing 1% of Lloyds TSB Group's pre-tax profits. The Foundation for Scotland receives 19.46% of this amount.

In 2008 we spent time consulting with Scottish charities to make sure we were still funding work of the most relevance to communities across Scotland. As a result of this we've made some changes to our grant-making criteria, priorities and principles. More detail on what we will or won't fund is in our criteria, priorities and principles leaflets. These are on our website, www.ltsbfoundationforscotland.org.uk, or you can call us on 0870 902 1201 and we'll send you copies.

Because different charities have different needs, the Foundation has developed a range of award programmes:

- Our biggest award programme is the standard grant scheme. This focuses on initiatives and services which are clearly targeted at working with at risk or disadvantaged groups, and that demonstrate the long term benefit that support from this Foundation could bring.

- To help charities take stock of how well they are performing, our capacity building grants pay for support from independent advisors.
- Funding for work with children and young people on issues around substance misuse is targeted through our partnership drugs initiative.
- Our overseas grants fund work in fragile overseas communities that is managed by Scottish charities.
- Employees of Lloyds TSB Group can apply for matched funding for their own fundraising or volunteering work.

The Foundation is governed by a Board of Trustees who meet six times a year to consider applications and grant funds. Their care and professionalism makes a huge difference to communities across Scotland. The work carried out by the Foundation and the level of awards it makes really does mean it is at the heart of funding Scotland's charities.

Standard Grant Scheme

The Standard Grant Scheme supports the work of registered charities in local communities across Scotland. Awards are made for anything from salaries to buying equipment.

The Yard is a specially adapted adventure play centre in Edinburgh which provides disabled children with a safe and accessible place to play with support from trained staff and carers. It runs free family sessions three times a week, sessions for 13 special schools, three youth clubs for young people with learning difficulties, a pre school playgroup for children with autism and an outreach summer service for disabled children and their siblings in the holidays. In 2008 it was awarded £10,948 to help pay for the salary of the Chief Executive. This brings the total it has been awarded to over £82,000.

Maureen Patterson, Chairperson, said: "For many of the children we work with The Yard is the only place they can really let of steam. Having somewhere safe to play really lets them grow and also lets their families relax as they know the children are safe. The Foundation has part-funded the salary of the Chief Executive for the last two years. It's hard to over-estimate the difference this has made to the organisation. Having stability for such a key post means we can deliver plans with continuity.

That's great for the staff, and most importantly for the youngsters and their families to whom we provide a service. We've made great changes over the last few years and are planning even more developments in the future."

We now have much more of a focus on evaluating the impact of the awards we make through this programme, so if you are going to apply for an award from 2009 make sure you have the new application form and guidance notes.

We make six rounds of awards each year. To help you to complete your application we hold funding surgeries across Scotland where you can speak to one of our Assessors, and we are also happy to speak to you by phone. If you'd like to make a surgery appointment or ask for advice or an application pack, call us on 0870 902 1201.

It is worth noting that we always receive applications for far more funding than we are able to provide, and so aren't able to say yes to everyone. You can see a list of who we funded in 2008 on pages 16 to 22.

For many charities it is a struggle to find the money to run their core services. This means that there is sometimes no money left over for helping the organisation itself develop, or understanding what is working well and what could do to be changed. Our Capacity Building Grants are designed to fill this gap. This is particularly important as people on the management committee or board change and the organisation can be left vulnerable, or if you've been through or are just about to go through major change.

Through dedicated time with an experienced independent advisor, key areas such as governance, financial management, resource and financial planning, information technology, fundraising, communications, strategic development and staff development will be explored. The first part of an award pays for a review of your organisation so you can really understand what is working and what you might want to change. The second stage helps you address the areas you feel most need to be developed.

Islay Disabled Endeavours & Action (IDEA) provides a wide range of support services on Islay and Jura for the elderly or for those who are disabled, have learning difficulties or mental health issues. Services are tailor made to suit clients' needs and are operated from the client's home, with the client in the wider community or at IDEA's Resource Centre in Bowmore.

Fergus Muir, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, said: "Like many organisations, we recognised that we would need to generate income ourselves to reduce our dependency on Local Authority funding. The capacity building work we've done has helped us plan a way forward, and we are now putting in place a fundraising strategy that will help us deliver our business plan for the next three years. For the Board, it has been extremely useful to give us new focus on how we develop the organisation so that it can deliver as much as possible for the local people we support."

You can apply for a capacity building grant at any time - there are no deadlines. You can also apply for an award through this programme at the same time as you either apply for or are in receipt of an award from our other award programmes.



Partnership Drugs Initiative

This programme brings together funding from the Foundation and the Scottish Government to support voluntary sector work with:

- Children and young people in families in which parents misuse drugs or alcohol.
- Pre-teen children who are at higher risk of developing problems with substance misuse.
- Young people up to the age of 25 who are developing or who have established problems with substance misuse.

There are some key ways in which this award programme is different to the others run by the Foundation:

- Every group that receives funding works in partnership with their local Alcohol and Drug Action Team and statutory groups.
- All the groups which receive awards must identify match funding for at least 50% of the project costs from another funding route.
- A group of young people is involved in assessing applications and helping us understand what will actually work.
- Applications are also considered by a steering group which is made up of people with a wide range of relevant expertise.
- All organisations that receive an award are required to attend training on evaluation to help them demonstrate the impact of their work and the positive difference it makes to the children and young people involved.
- There are two rounds of awards each year.

Link-Up Fraserburgh Ltd runs a youth mentoring project that supports vulnerable young people affected by substance misuse through mentoring. In 2008 they were awarded £16,842 over three years through the Partnership Drugs Initiative.

Speaking about their work Wilma Winton, co-ordinator, said: "It is so important that the many young people we see get the support they deserve. We've found that linking young people with a mentor has lots of benefits, from building confidence to helping them get involved in activities and learn new skills. Equally important is having access to a reliable adult, something most of us take for granted. Local teachers can see the difference mentoring makes, and something as basic as feeling more engaged with school has profound effects on these youngsters for the rest of their lives."

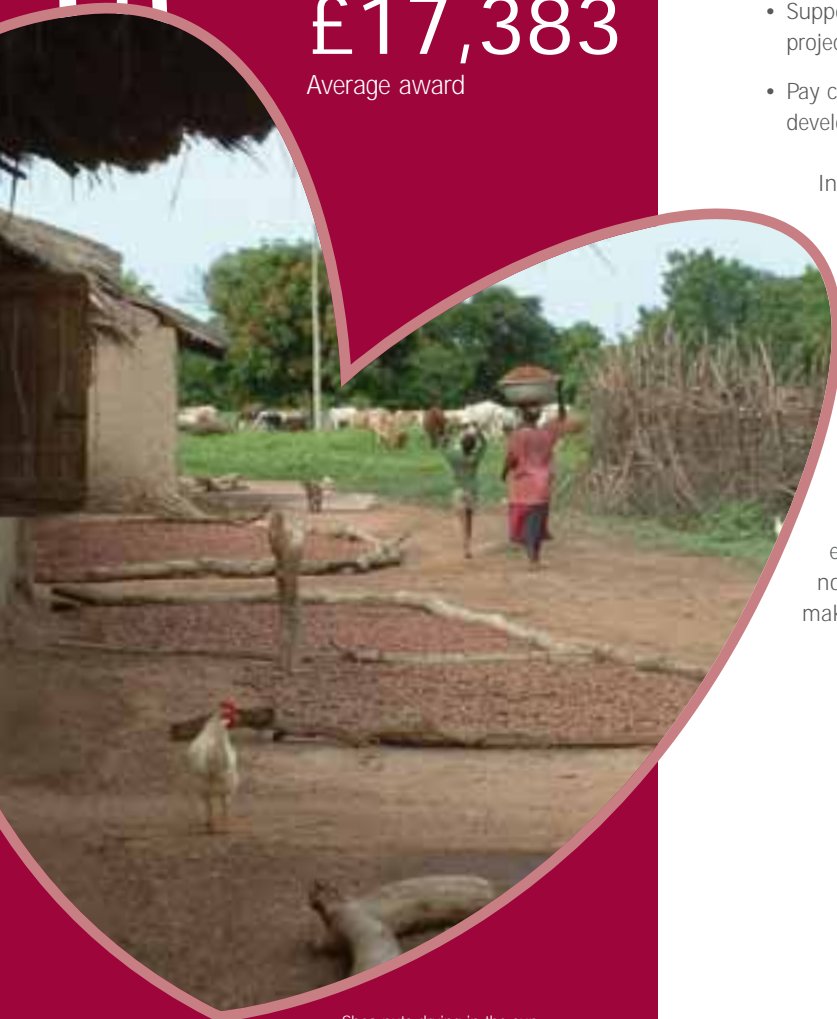
Overseas Grants

Our overseas awards are focused on supporting people in fragile overseas communities. In 2008 charities got funding for everything from training doctors to setting up a street newspaper and supporting a micro-loan scheme.

Registered Scottish charities managing work overseas communities can apply for awards which:

- Fund projects which build the capacity of organisations overseas, and develop their ability to advocate.
- Pay costs associated with running overseas volunteering programmes which focus on the development and transfer of skills.
- Support the initiation or continuation of sustainable indigenous projects overseas.
- Pay costs associated with bringing people to Scotland for training, development and study leading to sustainable development.

In 2008 Lasajang Community Project was awarded £11,450 to pay for equipment for shea butter production in Pulima village in northern Ghana. Helen Chebe, secretary, said: "By helping local women make a decent living they are much better placed to support their families. The shea nuts are a great source of income, and are pounded to produce butter which can be used for cooking, body lotion and medicinal purposes. What is left can be used as a fuel, and then the ash can be used to produce soap. The shell of the nut is also used as fertiliser. All the work was done manually, but this award means there is now a grinder and press which not only makes people's lives easier by making the work easier but also means they can now produce enough to sell. The extra money they earn makes a huge difference to them and to their children."

Staff Matched Giving Scheme

Lloyds TSB Group staff can apply for up to £500 a year to match their fundraising or voluntary work for charities. This encourages staff to get involved with charities in their own areas of Scotland and also greatly increases the amount of money going to the charities they support.

From selling home baking to running marathons, and holding art exhibitions to tap dancing, staff found fun and imaginative ways to raise money for charities. Volunteers helped charity shops, Scout groups, theatre clubs and local community groups.

Val McDiarmid who works for Lloyds TSB Scotland claimed £500 for the Scottish Blind Golf Society. "One of my sons, Cameron, is registered blind and he is the youngest member of the Society," she said. "He's played with them for the last six years, and for the last four has represented Scotland. He was also recently awarded an Order of Merit, and apart from being great experience it has really

boosted his confidence and opened up a whole new sport for him. My younger son and my husband have also been involved guiding Cameron, so this society has been a large part of our family's life. This year I held a race night to raise money for the group, and the extra £500 I was able to claim through matched giving helped boost the amount. Over the years I've claimed more than £2,200 through matched giving and the money does make a real difference."

Changing Times...Unchanged Values

In these changing times, Lloyds TSB Scotland's values are as important now as they were nearly 200 years ago, when Reverend Henry Duncan established the first savings bank to help his poorest parishioners save for times of hardship.

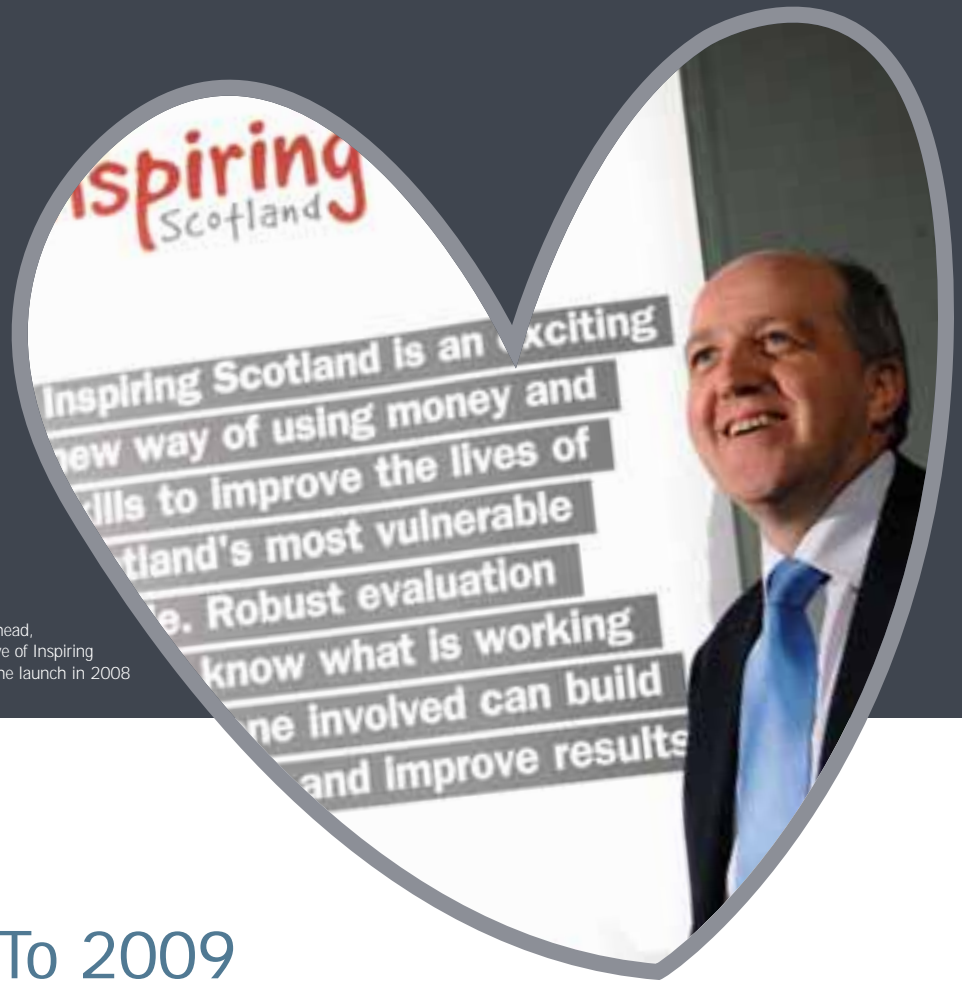
Lloyds TSB takes its environmental responsibilities seriously and has a stretching target to reduce CO₂ emissions by 30% by 2012. A new corporate and commercial office in Aberdeen was designed and built with sustainability in mind, and includes intelligent heating controls, video and audio conference facilities and a bicycle park.

In 2008, people across all parts of the Lloyds TSB Group in Scotland - Lloyds TSB Scotland, Scottish Widows, Black Horse Finance and Telephone Banking - gave their time and energy to a wide range of local and national causes. Lloyds TSB Foundation for Scotland made 424 matched-giving awards totalling £164,729, to charities supported by staff in Scotland.

The Bank's commitment to the communities in which it does business continues into 2009. Following the acquisition of HBOS plc in January, and the formation of the new Lloyds Banking Group, there's huge potential to make even more of a difference to the lives of many, many people.

Looking Forward To 2009

Inspiring change

Inspiring Scotland, a new long term model of funding for charities, was launched in 2008. It brings together investment from Government, individuals, business and other grant-making trusts and uses this alongside capacity building support to tackle social issues in Scotland. Inspiring Scotland's first fund is the 14:19 Fund which invests in work with 14 to 19 year olds who are struggling to make a successful transition from school to training, employment or further education. Through this fund an initial portfolio of 24 charities is receiving investment. The aim is to invest over £50 million in cash as well as pro-bono and reduced fee support over the next ten years to provide support for around 35,000 young people.

Having been developed by the Foundation, Inspiring Scotland became a completely independent organisation at the start of 2009. It has its own Board, chaired by Professor Niall Lothian, and Andrew Muirhead is Chief Executive. As well as delivering the 14:19 Fund work is already underway to develop a second fund which will tackle a different social issue.

Measuring success

Measurement has become a much more important aspect of our Standard Grants Scheme. With a new application form that puts more emphasis on tracking the difference our awards make, in 2009 we're looking forward to learning more about the impact the work of the Foundation has. This is extremely important to us as it will help shape our future grant-making and also allow the Foundation to continue to learn and develop.

Targeting funding

The Partnership Drugs Initiative has already carried out work to evaluate the effectiveness of the programme. In 2009 this will be built on through continuing in-depth assessment of project reviews. This will give improved understanding of how well current funding is working so that future funding can be targeted even more effectively and, if necessary, additional support for charities can be developed.

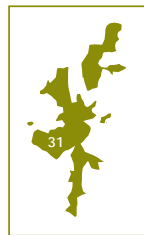
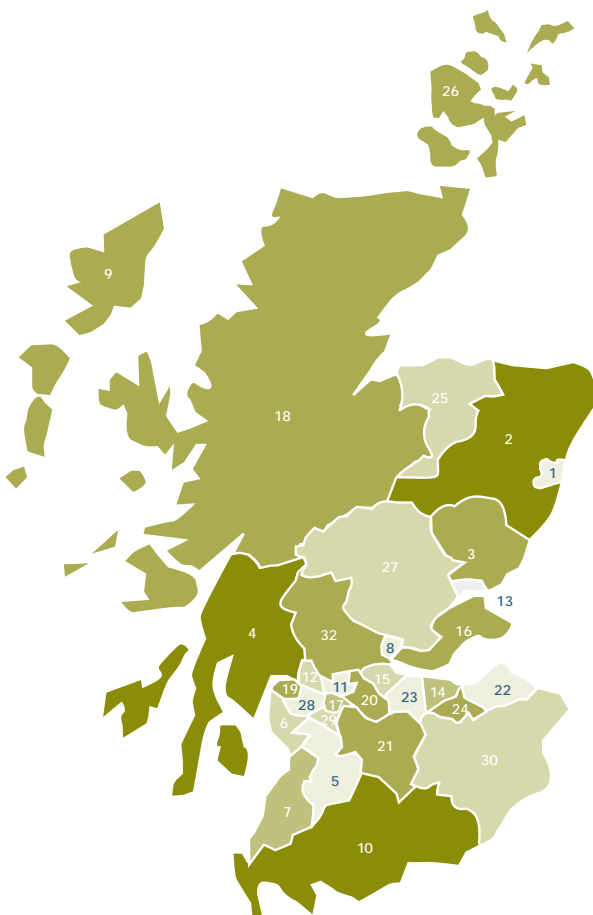
Awards Released In 2008
